


ANALYSIS OF CURRENT INMATE POPULATION IN COMMUNITY CORRECTIONAL CENTER



General Population

We were provided data on May 21, 2008 from Deputy Andrew Heisel of the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office regarding the 525 inmates assigned to the Community Correctional Center (CCC) at that time. Of those 525 inmates, 86% are male and 55% are white (this includes non-black Hispanics). See charts I & II below.




The inmates are distributed nearly evenly by age, with the largest portion (31%) between 26 and 35 years old. The next largest portion (29%) is between 18 and 25 years old. See chart III.



The 525 inmates are serving under convictions for an average of 1.7 offenses each, for a total of 897 offenses. However, for about 5% of the inmates, the charging info is not available. These 48 offenses have been taken out of the analysis below.

Nearly half of the convictions involve one or two offenses. Less than 1% of the inmates were convicted of 5 offenses. See chart IV below.




Types of Offense


The types of offenses for which CCC inmates have been convicted tend to be drug- and alcohol-related. We classified all of the offenses in the dataset into seven categories:

- **Traffic** - Includes OWI, OWR, OUI, OAR, fleeing an officer in a vehicle, and any other traffic related offense except vehicular homicide.

- **Drug** - Includes possession, manufacture, delivery, intent to deliver, and maintaining a drug trafficking facility, as well as fraudulently obtaining prescription drugs.
- **Property** - Includes theft, burglary, criminal damage to property, breaking/entering and fraud- or forgery-type offenses.
- **Violent** - Includes armed robbery, any offense with threat or use of force, any non-sexual assault or battery, 1st or 2nd degree sexual assault, and vehicular homicide.
- **Process** - Includes secondary offenses such as resisting arrest, jumping bail, violating a restraining order, and also disorderly conduct.
- **Gun** - Includes concealed weapon offenses, possession of firearm by felon, possessing an illegal firearm, and armed burglary.
- **Sex** - Includes prostitution, possession of child pornography, 3rd and 4th degree sexual assault, exposure, child enticement, exposing a child to harmful material, and using a computer to facilitate a child sex act.

See chart V for the count by type of offense and chart VI for the number of inmates by type of offense.





Traffic Offenses

Traffic offenses make up the bulk of offenses, with 208 inmates convicted of 447 offenses (169 inmates have more than one traffic charge). The breakdown of traffic charges is shown in table A, which tallies the first offense listed for each inmate in the dataset.



Eligibility for Home Detention

In the adopted 2008 Milwaukee County budget, the following offense were specified as not eligible for home detention with GPS monitoring: sexual assault, domestic violence, physical abuse of children, child neglect, possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver, battery, delivery of a controlled substance, felon in possession of a firearm, carrying a concealed weapon, second degree reckless endangerment of safety, armed robbery, robbery—party to a crime, causing great bodily harm by use of a vehicle, any charge resulting in a no-contact order, and burglary while armed.

Among the 525 inmates, 161 currently have convictions for at least one of the listed offenses. In all, 196 offenses from this list have been committed by these 166 individuals. Of the remaining 364 inmates, 48 have no charging information, resulting in 316 individuals potentially eligible for home detention.

Among those 316 inmates, there are 410 traffic-related offenses (70%), 71 property-related offenses (12%), and 32 drug-related offenses (5%). See chart VII.



The population of offenders eligible for home detention differs slightly from the general Community Corrections Center population: the eligible population is significantly more white (67% vs. 55%). In terms of gender and age distribution, the eligible population is nearly identical to the general population.
